#### May 20th Meeting Recap

Fishing for fluke, blues, striped bass, sea bass is breaking out all over the place! Now is the time to get out and do some fishing! Our club has fishing trips scheduled please sign up for the trips listed and the ones that are announced at our meetings. Before you know it, the summer will be gone and we will be scratching our heads to say, "where did it go"!

Skin cancer - I have had a pimple type growth on my left hand that would not go away no matter what I put on it. At first, I thought it was some problem related to dry skin. I went to a doctor and he diagnosed it as skin cancer. I will need surgery to remove all of it. Even though I always apply sunscreen before I go out to fish, I still got it on my hand. Who knows how it happened? However, be careful about the sun when you are fishing during the hot summer days! Wear a hat that is big enough to protect your face, neck and ears. Wear shirts that provide protection for your upper torso and try to buy those shirts that have UV protection built in them. I usually wear pants that are very light, to protect my legs from the sun and those nasty flies that land on your socks without you feeling them and bite right through them. In this newsletter, I have included an article on how to protect your self from skin cancer and please read it. I have a friend who had a pimple below his left eye and I noticed it was not going away and it seemed to get bigger (just like my experience). I told him to see a doctor and it turned out to be skin cancer. The doctor told him that if he waited much longer to get treatment, he could have possibly lost his eyesight in that eye! #### **Fishing Management Issues - John Toth**

Regionalization of Summer Flounder (Fluke) - I have been writing about this issue and in short, our state, NY and Conn. share the same quota for summer flounder when in the past, NJ had its own quota for summer flounder. Also, under regionalization, all three states shave the same size (18 inches) and bag limits (5). With the lower size limit, more NY anglers are coming into NJ waters since we all have the same limits. In the past, NY anglers had a much higher size limit. Member Mark Capalbo reported that he is saw so many NY boats in our waters that he has never seen before. The danger here is that if we exceed our fluke quota, our fluke fishery may be shut before it ends in September! Consequently, JCAA's Legislative Chairman, Tom Fote, testified at a May 19th Senate Environment Committee to oppose regionalization so that it ends this year and NOT be approved for 2015. This Senate committee passed a resolution approving regionalization to end this year.

**Seismic Blasting** - Just about every organization (JCAA, NJOA, Clean Ocean Action) is against it, even the commercial anglers. The stated purpose of this blasting of sound waves is to track changes in sea levels over the **last 60 million years** to better understand climate change and historical changes in sea levels. It is being funded by the National Science Foundation. A number of universities have been given grants to be involved in this seismic testing, including Rutgers. The danger here is that these strong sound waves will kill or disrupt our fisheries including whales, squid and just about every fish that is exposed to it. There is strong public opposition to this blasting and its outcome is unclear at this point. The suspicion is that this testing is not being done for climate change, but to locate deposits of oil and gas off our shores.

#### **Shark River Fish Kill**

There was a lot of media coverage over this fish kill on May 12th with a lot of speculation over its cause. An article in the Asbury Park Press (May 29th) indicated that the Shark River is dying a slow death because its river needs dredging to save the waterway and preserve the quality of marine life there. Dredging was needed before Sandy, and Sandy made it worse. The cost to do it is \$5 million. Estimates by our state put the fish hill of menhaden at **1/2 million pounds!** If the river had been deeper, there would have been more water and oxygen in

been deeper, there would have been more water and oxygen in the river that would have avoided the killing of the fish. Even at low tide, boats pick up mud and are a hazard for boat props. A retired state official from our Marine Fisheries said that the river has so little water in it that it becomes a trap for large fish during low tide. Town officials said that they have been trying to get the state to dredge this body of water for 17 years, so may be with this fish kill that got so much media attention that something will finally be done about it now!

#### Skin Cancer – Be Careful!

Our fishing season kicking into high gear and we will be on the water, especially during the hot summer months when the sun really beats down on us. That hot sun also raises the possibility of getting skin cancer and a number of anglers have had parts of the ears, nose and other areas of their skin removed. It is important to understand the types of rays that can harm us. There are two types of Ultraviolet rays and they are UVB and UVA rays. The UVB rays penetrate the outer layer of skin causing damage to skin cells and it is the primary cause of skin cancer. The UVA rays can even pass through window glass and penetrate deep into the layers of skin contributing to premature aging of skin, wrinkles and of course cancer.

It is very important to have the right protection and sun blocks that have a SPF rating (sun protection factor) that you need to look out for. Appling a sunscreen with a SPF of 15 for example, means that it will take 15 times longer for your skin to burn. However, SPF measures protection from sunburn **caused** mainly by UVB rays, but it does not measure how well a sunscreen protects from UVA rays. Therefore, it is important to select a sunscreen that has a UVA/UVB protection.

So use a sunscreen that has a SPF of at least 15 or higher. Also, don't forget to apply a lip balm since your lips also receive these dangerous rays. In addition to using sun blocks, always wear a hat to give your head protection from the sun. Wear one that has a wide brim to give your ears and neck the needed protection. There are shirts for sale that are especially designed for anglers that have the pockets you want but they also offer the protection from the UVB and UVA rays. They can be purchased from various catalogues or at fishing stores. Sunglasses to protect your eyes from sun glare are also important and you can get the needed protection from sunglasses that cost \$15 to \$300+ in price. Berkely sells sunglasses that are very reasonably priced and provide you the right protection from these harmful rays. Enjoy your fishing, but protect yourself from harmful rays!

**2014 Big Fish Contest Rules:** To limit confusion about the rules governing our Big Fish Contest, our Board members discussed this issue and agreed to the following provisions that would take into effect for 2014 and in the future:

- 1. Fish have to be in season to be entered.
- 2. The fish can be caught anywhere, not in just New Jersey's waters.
- 3. The fish entered has to be verified by the boat captain or another club member or at an official weigh station. A picture of the fish is a much-preferred way to verify an entry into the Big Fish contest done by a cell phone or a regular camera.
- 4. A club member can win more than one Big Fish contest prize.
- 5. Dues card number must be on the submitted application (Dues number can be obtained from our Membership Secretary)
- 6. Affidavits must be received within 30 days after the fish is caught. Entries for fish caught after 12/15 of a given year must be received by Janaury15th of the following year.

Any member submitting a false affidavit will be disqualified from entering the contest during the year. If disqualified twice, the member will be expelled from the club.
