So, using ice and some salt water can help to win a pool in close call scenario and the other sure benefit is that cold fish are a lot easier to fillet than on that ones that are warm and mushy. 4 more dolphins found dead along Jersey Shore in past day

Ed Murray/The Star-Ledger Three dolphins turned up dead off the Jersey Shore this morning and one more washed up Thursday, increasing the total to 25 since July 9, according to a report on Philly.com. Two of the dolphins came ashore near Avalon and one appeared in Lower this morning. The fourth washed up Thursday in Ocean City, the Inquirer reported. That dolphin had not yet died, but a passing shark then bit it and killed it, the report said. Four of the first 21 had pneumonia and one tested positive for a measles-like virus known as morbillivirus. The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection issued a statement Thursday saying the water is not to blame. "While the underlying cause of the deaths has not been confirmed they appear to be part of a natural disease cycle and not related to water quality, which has been excellent this summer. "Dead dolphins have appeared off of Monmouth, Ocean, Atlantic and Cape May counties this summer. Dolphins off the Virginia coast are having an even tougher time. Five beached dolphins were found in Virginia alone on Thursday. In July, nearly four dozen dead dolphins were found, mostly in Norfolk and along the southern part of the Chesapeake Bay. That's up from the typical six or seven usually picked up in July by the Virginia Aquarium Stranding Response Team. Delaware and Maryland also have seen an uptick in dolphin deaths. According to The Press of Atlantic City, 10 dead dolphins were picked up in Delaware between June and early July, when in a typical year only five or six are recorded. In Maryland, authorities said a spike had been noticed but exact numbers of deaths were not known. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration has sent inquiries to stranding centers along the East Coast to determine whether spikes have been seen elsewhere. In New Jersey, initial necropsy results have pointed to pneumonia, but Maggie Mooney-Seus, spokeswoman for NOAA's National Marine Fisheries Service, was not ready to connect Virginia's dieoff to what may be affecting dolphins in other states. "We don't know at this point what has caused the upswing," she said. "Virginia is higher than New Jersey, but we don't know anything particular because we're still collecting data. "Virginia's stranding team says the elevated numbers are reminiscent off the mass deaths that occurred in 1987, when more than 750 carcasses washed ashore from New Jersey to Florida. A few years later, morbillivirus — similar to measles — was determined to be the culprit, as dolphins exhibited symptoms associated with measles and pneumonia." It's eerily familiar," Susan Barco, research coordinator for the Virginia Aquarium & Marine Science Center of the recent stranding's. "That is one virus we're looking for now."

### Deaths of 6 dolphins along Jersey Shore could be tied to commercial fisherman

Last week a pod of dolphin travel south just beyond the swimming area in Asbury Park. Six dolphins were found dead off the coast of Ocean County and Cape May County in recent days. (*Andrew Mills/The Star-Ledger*)

SHIP BOTTOM — Officials are trying to determine if the deaths of six dolphins along the New Jersey shore in one week are linked to commercial fishing. The first washed up on Long Beach Township on July 18. Two were found in Holgate and Barnegat Light on Monday. Two more turned up on Wednesday in Holgate and Ocean City. The last was found in Ship Bottom on Thursday. Bob Schoelkopf of the Marine Mammal Stranding Center tells The Press of Atlantic City one dolphin had a knife wound running from its neck down its stomach. Two others showed signs of being ensnared in fishing net.

Officials are awaiting results of necropsies.

#### **JCAA Fluke Tournament**

The JCAA Fluke Tournament was held on August 24<sup>th</sup> and a total of 328 boats were entered into this tournament, including some of our club members. The 328 boats is the lowest number of boats since the JCAA has been running this tournament, most likely due to Hurricane Sandy that destroyed or damaged 50,000 boats in our state. The weather was also horrible and that factor did not help for more boats entering into the tournament.

The largest fish was 10.55 lbs., that was entered at Clarks Landing in Point Pleasant and the second largest was an 8.94 lb. fish that was weighed in at the Long Beach Island weigh station. Each of these anglers will receive \$1,200 prize money to share with the anglers who were on their boats. The JCAA Awards Ceremony for the winners of the contests held in 10 ports will take place at the Golden Nugget in Atlantic City on September 6<sup>th</sup> with about 1,000 anglers that will attend it.

# Cheesy /Garlic/Fresh Basil Fluke – By John Toth (A very nice way to prepare fluke that is very tasty)

### **Ingredients:**

- Fluke -1 ½ to 2 lbs. fillets (or sea bass, ling) if cod or Pollock is used, cut the thick fillets in half so that they are not too thick)
- 1 ½ TB. Basil (dry)
- 1 TB. Minced garlic
- 1 Tsp. minced lemon peel (cut the rind off a fresh lemon and chop very fine if you do not have a grater for the peel)
- ½ Cup of white wine
- Ground white or black pepper to taste (prefer white)
- Salt to taste (cheese has salt in it already did not add it)
- 2 TB. Butter cut up in small pats
- ½ Cup of fresh basil leaves coarsely chopped
- 6 TB. Grated Asiago cheese, divided use Parmesan if you don't have Asiago

### **Preparation:**

- 1. Preheat oven to **355** degrees
- 2. In a small bowl, combine the dry Basil, Garlic, Lemon Peel, and wine and let soak for 5 minutes mix well
- 3. Arrange the fish in an oven proof-baking dish, 13 inches by 9 inches.
- 4. Pour the spice mixture over the fish and sprinkle with pepper & salt
- 5. Dot the fillets with butter and top with fresh basil
- 6. Sprinkle 4 TB. of Asiago or Parmesan cheese and bake for 20 25 minutes depending on thickness or until fish flakes easy with a fork (do not overcook)
- 7. Take dish out of the oven and sprinkle with the remaining 2 TB. of cheese and serve.

Chilled white wine and salad goes good with this, makes nice juice with French bread etc., on the side. ENJOY
